## Mary Connell – a leader in the best sense of the word

A fter twelve years of exemplary service as secretary of the parish Peace and Justice Group, Mary Connell resigned at the end of 2018.

Since the group's inception, Mary has held it together with her ever reliable organisation of the meetings and her pursuit of government decision makers for information about what Australia was doing to seek justice for people on our society's margins.

Not surprisingly, Mary leaves the group in good order with Bernadette Murray taking over the position of secretary and members committed to the goals of the group.

The Peace and Justice Group under Mary's leadership has a record of lobbying parliamentarians on the plight of asylum seekers in detention both on and off shore. Government policies for too long have denied the rights of people to seek refuge from oppression

Currently the group is watching with interest what will unfold for asylum seekers held in off-shore detention since Federal Parliament passed the Medivac Bill.

Over many years Mary, with other P & J group members, attended rallies and demonstrations, including the Palm Sunday marches for justice and compassion for refugees.

Mary also encouraged all member of the P & J Group to pursue issues of particular interest to them and bring reports of their activities to the meetings.

Bernadette has been a constant visitor to asylum seeker families held in detention centres onshore. Therese has kept the group up to date with issues raised by ACRATH (Australian Catholic Religious Against Trafficking in Humans) on modern slavery with the exploitation of workers overseas in the chocolate and cotton industries.

The Parish Prayer Focus is an initiative of the P & J Group and Mary will continue to write one each month to be read at the Masses during the Prayers of the Faithful.

Mary has qualities of leadership which were noted by people who knew her when she worked as a school principal from 1988 to 2004. She has been described as 'a true leader, humble, supportive, approachable and caring yet strong when she needed to be.' A person who 'led by example' and was 'much loved by children, parents and staff'.

Not surprisingly Mary will be greatly missed by all in the parish Peace and Justice Group. We have learnt much from Mary and, while she has resigned from the group, we have no doubt that she will continue to be supportive of its activities well into the future.

























#### Making music for our Liturgies

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#### **Blessing of the Rivers**

The Blessing of the Rivers event took place on 16 February at the junction of the Murray Darling Rivers as a prayer service to draw attention to the plight of the rivers.


Local Mercy sisters in Mildura, Helen Nolen and Carmel Setford, together with Adele Howard from Melbourne helped organise the event at the request of a farmer from near Warrnambool, Rob Rowley, and musician Shane Howard.

Local Barkindji elder Badger Bates welcomed the large crowd and spoke of the dying Darling River and the mass fish kills that had occurred. He then went to Canberra the next day to engage in discussions with decision-makers about the plight of the Darling River.

Water came to the ceremony from many Mercy places in Australia, including

the Institute Centre at Stanmore (New South Wales), Mercy College and Mercy Convent at Coburg (Victoria) and Mercy Creek Seville in Cairns (Queensland) and Pascoe Vale!

Consciousness of the crisis of the Darling River was raised in the preparation phase and among those who went to the trouble of sending or bringing water to the river for the blessing ceremony where healing and action was prayed for.



#### **Modern Day Slavery Act**

Inder new federal legislation, introduced late last year, companies with a consolidated annual revenue of more than \$100 million must provide a written statement on what steps they are taking to ensure their supply chains are slavery-free. Companies have until July 2020 to comply with the changes.

The Chair of the Sydney Archdiocese's Anti-Slavery Taskforce, John McCarthy QC, said: "As one of the largest employers in the country, the Catholic Church is taking a leading role in working to ensure our supply chains comply with the new laws.

Paul Sharkey, from Catholic Education Melbourne, along with Australian Catholic Religious Against Trafficking in Humans, made the decision to focus on a few initiatives to raise awareness of modern slavery and encourage schools to make more informed choices. "It is easy to think of slavery as a remote issue, either not much to do with Australia or not much to do with our time in history. In fact, the choices we make very much support or discourage slavery and so we need to become much more educated in this area," Dr Sharkey said. "The campaign around purchasing fair trade tea and coffee seemed like a good place to start as did the campaign to buy slavery-free chocolate for Easter eggs."



Dr Sharkey said the campaign will not be an entirely easy feat. "The first hurdle is for people to realise that slavery has many forms and that it is real and that we are involved in it, at least to some degree, by the clothes we buy, the chocolate we eat and so on," he said. "The second hurdle is more practical: Which products should we buy? Are there issues around quality or price?" Dr Sharkey said some schools were already making the switch to fair-trade goods before Catholic Education Melbourne embarked on the campaign. "I know others have been encouraged to get on board because they have seen some merit in the position that we have put to them," he said. "My hope is that the campaign gathers good momentum in the coming months."

#### **Five years with Francis**

n early February, our Parishioners were invited to the Festival of Evensong at Christ Church, the Anglican Church in Brunswick, where Anglican Archbishop David Moxon delivered the Philip Harris Memorial Lecture. David is the former director of the Anglican Centre in Rome and was the Archbishop of Canterbury's representative there. He spoke of his five years in Rome, particularly of the occasions he met with Pope Francis, and gave many examples of Pope Francis' warmth and some delightful examples of his sense of humour.

During Archbishop Moxon's time in Rome a very important gathering occurred. All the faith leaders from across the world breached cultural, religious

and political divides to come together in Vatican City to pledge an end to modern slavery and human trafficking. They were joined by leaders from many countries of the world representing the business, political and civil sectors. In this watershed event global leaders from the Christian Catholic Anglican and Orthodox religions as well as Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish and Muslim faiths signed the Joint Declaration of Religious Leaders Against Modern Slavery.
